MINUTES FOR JULY 11, 2016

BOARD OF CHEROKEE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

CHEROKEE COUNTY, KANSAS

CONVENE

Chairman Myers called the regular session of the Cherokee County Board of Commissioners (The Board), to order and led all in attendance in the Pledge of Allegiance at 9:00 AM on Monday, July 11, 2016 in the Commission Room, #109 of the Cherokee County Courthouse located at 110 W Maple St., Columbus, Kansas. Commissioners Robert Myers, Pat Collins, Charles Napier, County Counselor Barbara Wright and County Clerk Rodney Edmondson were present.

Members of the press present: Larry Hiatt, Jordan Zabel, and Machelle Smith

A motion was made by Commissioner Collins to enter an Executive Session for the purpose of Non-Elected Personnel for a period of 10 minutes with Counselor Wright and Deana Randall. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Napier. The motion carried 3-0 at 9:08 AM.

The meeting reconvened at 9:18 AM.

No action was taken during the Executive Session.

Leonard Vanatta - County Road Supervisor

He appeared before the Board on routine county road business.

He stated that two local farmers are asking for permission to place a gate across a dead end county road at SW 90th St. and Blackjack Rd. There are no houses on the road and they farm both sides of the road. They reported that people are dumping trash and driving 4-wheelers in the fields. The Board asked Leonard to take a look at the area and report back.

Leonard made a request for the placement of permanent stop signs to stop the northbound and southbound traffic at NW 20th St. and Liberty Rd. The Board asked Counselor Wright to prepare a resolution for the placement of the signs.

Larry Sharp - KCAMP

He appeared before the Board to present an award to Cherokee County in recognition of 25 years as a Charter Member of the Kansas County Association Multiline Pool.

Bill Dehart, Brad Wells - Cherokee County Fair Board

They appeared before the Board to discuss funding for the County Fair in 2017. They stated that with the new agreement with the American Legion, the Fair Board will lose \$6,000 in funding. They aren't asking the County to increase their funding that much, but any additional assistance by the County would be appreciated.

A motion was made by Commissioner Napier to approve the Minutes of the June 27, 2016 BOCC meeting as written. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Collins. The motion carried 3-0.

A motion was made by Commissioner Collins to approve the Minutes of the July 1, 2016 BOCC meeting as written. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Napier. The motion carried 3-0.

A motion was made by Commissioner Napier to take a 10 minute recess. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Collins. The motion carried 3-0 at 9:48 AM.

The meeting reconvened at 9:58 AM.

Department Heads - Monthly Reports

They met with the Board for their routine monthly meeting for the purpose of updating the Board on happenings within each department, with the following department heads present: Barbara Bilke, Register of Deeds; Betha Elliott, Health Department; Logan Grant, Noxious Weeds; Deana Randall, Human Resources; Jason Allison, Emergency Management; Janet Miller, Economic Development; Mark Hixon, Appraiser; Nathan Coleman, Attorney; Rodney Edmondson, Clerk/Election; Wayne Elliott, 911 Addressing & Mapping.

Barbara Bilke - She provided a written report of the Register of Deeds Office.

Betha Elliott - She reported that her office has computer issues this morning, but they are working now.

Logan Grant - He reported that he has passed all of his testing and is fully licensed.

Deana Randall - She is awaiting the results of goal attainment from the employee health screening. She stated that employee participation was better than last year, but still low.

Janet Miller - She reported that they are in the new office space. She has a copy of the lease agreement that she will send to Counselor Wright for review.

Jason Allison - He is still waiting on the final answer on the Flood Buyout Program. He reported that KDOT will pay for the relocation of the storm sirens for the Highway 7 Project.

Mark Hixon - He provided a written update of the Appraisers Office.

Nathan Coleman - He reported business as usual. He stated that the Courtroom could use some updating in the area of electronic access and viewing.

Rodney Edmondson - He reported that early voting for the August primary starts Wednesday. He also stated that the mass mailing project for voter maintenance is complete.

Wayne Elliott - He reported the sale of \$154 in maps, issuance of five new addresses, and the making of eight new street signs.

Betha Elliott presented a request from one of her employees to sell two vacation days. Counselor Wright stated that there is no written policy to prohibit that action.

A motion was made by Commissioner Collins to approve the request for the sale of two vacation days by a county employee. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Napier. The motion carried 3-0.

A motion was made by Commissioner Napier to enter an Executive Session with the Board, Counselor Wright, and Appraiser Mark Hixon for a period of 10 minutes for the purpose of Non-Elected Personnel. The motion carried 3-0 at 10:40 AM.

The meeting reconvened at 10:50 AM.

The Board stated that the Class LTD Budget request will be considered along with all other budgets during the upcoming budget process.

Barbara Wright - County Counselor

She appeared before the Board regarding legal matters concerning Cherokee County.

She presented a draft resolution for review by the Board concerning the carrying of handguns by county employees. The Board placed the item on the agenda next week with the changes to the draft as discussed.

She presented a draft for a new contract for the tower lease with Jack Maxton. The Board asked for the item to be placed on the agenda next week for consideration.

She presented a draft resolution for a Right-of-Way Policy for Cherokee County. The Board asked for the item to be placed on the agenda next week for consideration.

Carey Spoon - SEK Regional Planning Commission

She appeared regarding the environmental assessment for the CDBG Galena Bridge Project. Chairman Myers signed the documents necessary for the publication and the release of funds to allow the project to move forward.

Toni Spieth, Regina Jameson - Community Free Lunch Program

They appeared before the Board concerning the summer free lunch program provided by area churches. They have provided free lunches to citizens for 21 years. There are four churches involved in the program with eight to twelve volunteers from each church. They asked the Board to consider financial assistance for the program. The Board took their request under consideration.

A motion was made by Commissioner Napier to appoint Commissioner Collins as the delegate for the KAC Conference in November. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Myers. The motion carried 3-0.

A motion was made by Commissioner Myers to renew the Lease Agreement with William T. and Shelli L. VanCleave. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Collins. The motion carried 3-0.

A motion was made by Commissioner Myers to enter an Executive Session with the Board and Counselor Wright for the purpose of Attorney/Client Privilege for a period of 15 minutes. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Napier. The motion carried 3-0 at 11:30 AM.

The meeting reconvened at 11:46 AM.

No action was taken during the Executive Session.

A motion was made by Commissioner Napier to approve Resolution 18-2016 establishing a Code of Ethics Policy for Officials and Employees of Cherokee County. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Myers. The motion carried 3-0.

Commissioner Napier made a motion to adjourn until the next regular meeting set for Monday, July 18, 2016 at 9:00 AM. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Collins. The motion carried 3-0 at 11:48 AM.

LEASE AGREEMENT

1. This LEASE AGREEMENT is hereby made between the Board of County Commissioners of Cherokee County, Kansas, (hereinafter referred to as "Lessor"), and William T. VanCleave and Shelli L. VanCleave, (Hereinafter referred to as "Lessees"), wherein Lessor shall lease to Lessees, under the following terms and conditions, the premises located in Cherokee County, Kansas, legally described as follows:

Lot Seventeen (17) Scott's 2nd Subdivision, Cherokee County, Kansas, according to the recorded plat thereof

- 2. The term of this lease shall be for three (3) years. Upon the lease expiration, the Lessees shall return to Lessor all keys to the premises. The lease hereunder will be terminated upon Lessor providing notice to Lessees to vacate such premises, and in such event, Lessees shall have no more than 30 days to vacate the premises, unless such period allowed to Lessees to vacate is extended by Lessor, in writing. Lessor need not show cause to terminate this lease, and may so terminate this lease with its sole discretion.
- 3. Lessees shall pay the Lessor annual rent of \$1.00 payable in advance upon the execution of this lease. Payment shall be made to: Cherokee County, Kansas.
- 4. Any utilities to the premises shall be paid promptly by Lessees. Lessor shall not be responsible for the payment of any utilities contracted for by Lessees. Utilities may be supplied to the lease premises only after written consent of the Lessor. Lessees shall be solely responsible for the costs of the supplying of any such utility.
- 5. Lessees shall make no alterations to any building or land leased herein without the prior written consent of Lessor. In the event written permission is given by Lessor, no alteration, addition, modification, or other attachment shall thereafter be removed by Lessees upon termination of this lease.
- 6. In the event the Lessor defaults in any of the terms and conditions of this lease, the Lesses shall give the Lessor a notice to cure and the Lessor shall have

10 days from the receipt of such notice to effect a cure. But upon the Lessor's failure to cure, the Lessees shall have no right to bring a proceeding for specific performance, and shall be entitled to only the return of a prorated share of the annual lease paid for the existing lease term. Such prorated payment to be returned to the Lessees by the Lessor shall be determined by dividing the number of days passed during the current lease term by 365, and applying such percentage, rounded to tenths, to the total lease payment.

- 7. It is agreed that all notices to cure shall be deemed given at the time the notice is placed in the United States Mail, and all calculation of time within which a party has to cure shall be made from the time of placing such notice in the mail. Such notice shall be sent by certified mail properly addressed to the Board of County Commissioners of Cherokee County, Kansas, when Lessees shall send notice.
- 8. The Lessees who sign this lease agreement shall be entitled to usage of the property. Lessees shall not be permitted charge any person or entity a fee or rent related to the usage of the property.

The premises are also leased subject to the following conditions:

- a. All conditions stated in the deed exhibiting current ownership of the Property in Cherokee County, Kansas, recorded in the office of the Cherokee County, Kansas, Register of Deeds. These conditions include, but are not limited to the following: 1.) the premises shall remain in public ownership; 2.) the premises shall only be used for purposes consistent with sound land management and use, as these terms are defined in Title 44, Code of Federal Regulation, Section, 206, as it now appears or may be hereafter amended; 3.) the premises will only be used for open space purposes.
- b. No structure or improvement shall be erected upon the premises by the Lessees. Lessees shall erect no structure or improvement in violations of any deed restrictions in the deed or deeds from which Lessor derived its title of ownership.

Failure to do abide by these conditions shall constitute a breach of this lease agreement.

9. The Lessees agree to do the following:

- a. Keep that part of the premises that such Lessees occupy and use as clean and safe as the condition of the premises permits;
- b. Remove from the leased premises all ashes, rubbish, garbage, and other waste in a clean and safe manner and promptly after the usage thereof;
- c. Be responsible for any destruction, defacement, damage, impairment or removal of any part of the premises caused by an act or omission of the Lessees or by any person or animal or pet on the premises at any time with the express or implied consent of the Lessees;
- d. Obey all laws and ordinances of the United State, the State of Kansas, and the local governmental authorities with respect the possession and usage of the premises;
- e. Lessees shall notify the Lessor promptly of any damage caused by the Lessees, Lessees's invitees, family, pets, or animals, to the lease premises.
- 10. Lessees shall not sublease nor assign this lease agreement or any rights thereunder.
- 11. Lessor shall have the right to enter the leased premises at any time with or without notice to the Lessees in order to inspect the premises, make necessary repairs, decorations, alterations, or improvements. Lessor may further enter the dwelling unit without the consent of Lessees in the event of an extreme hazard involving the potential loss of life or severe property damage to property of Lessor, Lessees or other person residing in or upon the premises.
- 12. No oral agreements or representations by the Lessor or Lessees shall be binding on either party. This written LEASE AGREEMENT constitutes the full agreement of the parties, and there are no other agreements.
- 13. At the expiration of the terms or any extensions thereto, Lessees shall surrender the premises in as good a condition as it was at the beginning of the term, reasonable wear and tear, damage not occasioned by the act or omission of Lessees, its agents, employees, and invitees, excepted.
- 14. Lessor shall not be liable for injury or damage to person or property occurring on the lease premises unless caused by or resulting from the negligence

from the Lessor or its agents in the operation or maintenance of the leased property.

- 15. In the event that the leased property or any part thereof is taken by eminent domain, the lease shall be deemed to terminate on the date of the taking. Rent shall be prorated as of said date.
- 16. The laws of the state of Kansas shall govern the validity, performance, and enforcement of this lease. The parties agree that this lease is the entire agreement between the parties and no earlier statements or prior written matter have any force and effect. Neither party is relying on any representations or agreements other than those contained in the lease. In the event that any portion of this lease shall be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the parties agree that the remaining terms and provisions of this lease shall remain in full force and effect. "Lessees" is hereby substituted for the term "Lessee" whenever this lease is signed below by more than one person or entity leasing the premises described herein, and all necessary subject-verb agreement between Lessees and the subject verb is to be implied and substituted into this document. This lease shall be effective upon the date of the last signature thereto.

By their signatures below the Lessor and Lessees acknowledge that they have read this contract and all of its terms and conditions were explained to their satisfaction. This contract shall be binding on the heirs and assigns of the parties hereto.

RESOLUTION NO. 18-2016

A RESOLUTION DECLARING A CODE OF ETHICS FOR OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES OF CHEROKEE COUNTY, KANSAS

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF CHEROKEE COUNTY, KANSAS, THAT THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED:

SECTION 1. GENERAL AUTHRITY. K.S.A. 19-101, et. seq., and K.S.A. 19-212 authorize the Board of County Commissioners of Cherokee County, Kansas, to transact all County business and perform all powers of local legislation deemed appropriate, and to make all contracts and do all other acts in relation to the property and concerns of the County necessary to the exercise of its corporate or administrative powers.

SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE ACTION. Public officials and government employees shall perform duties dedicated to obtaining stated objectives and shall conduct themselves with integrity, according to the highest ethical standards, while employed by the government and serving the best interests of Cherokee County, Kansas, as outlined below:

A. Declaration of Policy

The proper operation of out government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial, and responsible to the people, that the government decisions and policy be made in the proper channels and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government. In recognition of those goals, there is hereby established a code of ethics for all officials and employees, whether elected or appointed, paid or unpaid. The purpose of this code is to establish ethical standards by setting forth those acts or actions that are incompatible with the best interests of the County.

B. Responsibilities of Public Office

Public officials and employees are agents of public purpose and hold office for the benefit of the public. They are bound to uphold the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State and to carry out impartially the laws of the nation, state, and County and thus to foster respect for all government. They are bound to observe in their official acts the highest standards of morality and to discharge faithfully the duties of their office regardless of personal considerations, recognizing that the long-term public interest must be their primary concern. Their conduct in both their official and private affairs should be above reproach.

C. Dedicated Service

All officials and employees of the County should be responsive to the political objectives expressed by the electorate and the programs developed to attain those objectives. Appointive officials and employees should adhere to the rules of work and performance established as the standard for their positions by the appropriate authority.

Officials and employees should not exceed their authority or breach the law or ask others to do so, and they should work in full cooperation with other public officials and employees unless prohibited from so doing by law or by officially recognized confidentiality of their work.

D. Fair and Equal Treatment

- 1. Interest in Appointments. Canvassing of members of the County commission, directly or indirectly, in order to obtain preferential consideration in connection with any appointment to the municipal service shall disqualify the candidate for appointment except with reference to positions filled by appointment by the County commission.
- 2. Use of Public Property. No official or employee shall request or permit the use of County-owned vehicles, equipment, materials, or property for personal convenience or profit, except when such service are available to the public generally or are provided as County policy for the use of such official or employee in the conduct of official business.
- 3. Obligations to Citizens. No official or employee shall grant any special considerations, treatment, or advantage to any citizen beyond that which is available to every other citizen.

E. Conflict of Interest.

No elected or appointive County official or employee, whether paid or unpaid, shall engage in any business or transaction or shall have a financial or other personal interest, direct or indirect, which is incompatible with the proper discharge of his or hers duties in the public interest or would tend to impair his or her independence of judgment or action in the performance of his or her official duties. Personal as distinguished from financial interest includes an interest arising from blood or marriage relationships or close business or political association.

Specific conflicts of interest are enumerated below for the guidance of officials and employees:

1. Incompatible Employment. No elected official or appointive County official or employee shall engage in or accept private employment or render services for private interests when such employment or service is incompatible with the proper discharge of his or her official duties or would tend to impair his or her independence of judgment or action in the performance of his or her official duties.

- 2. Disclosure of Confidential Information. No elected official or appointive County official or employee, shall, without proper legal authorization, disclose confidential information concerning the property, government, or affairs of the County. Nor shall he or she sue such information to advance the financial or other private interest of himself, herself, or others.
- 3. Gift and Favors. No elected or appointive County official or County employee shall accept any valuable gift, whether in the form of service, loan, thing, or promise, from any person, firm, or corporation which to his or her knowledge is interested directly or indirectly in any manner whatsoever in business dealings with the County; nor shall any such official or employee (a) accept any gift, favor, or thing of value that may tend to influence him or her in the discharge of his or her or (b) grant in the discharge of his or her duties any improper favor, service, or thing of value. The prohibition against gifts or favor shall not apply to (a) an occasional nonpecuniary gift of only nominal value or (b) an award publicly present in recognition of public service or (c) any gift which would have been offered or given to him or her if not an official or employee.
- 4. Representing Private Interest Before County Agencies. No elected or appointive County official or employee whose salary is paid in whole or in part by the County shall appear in behalf of private interest before any agency of this County. He or she shall not represent private interests in any action or proceedings against the interest of the County in any litigation to which the County is a party.
- 5. No County officer or employee shall be signatory upon, discuss in an official capacity, vote on any issue concerning or otherwise participate in his or her capacity as a public official or employee in making of any contract with any person or business:
 - a. In which the officer or employee owns a legal or equitable interest exceeding \$5,000 or five percent, whichever is less, individually or collectively with his or her spouse; or
 - b. From which the officer or employee receives, in the current or immediately preceding or succeeding calendar year, any salary, gratuity, other compensation, or a contract for or promise or expectation of any such salary gratuity, or other compensation or remuneration having a dollar value of \$1,000 or more; or
 - c. In which he or she shall hold the position of officer or director, irrespective of the amount of compensation received from or ownership held in the business.

SECTION 3. PUBLICATION. The County Clerk shall cause this resolution to be published in the official County Newspaper.

SECTION 4. CONFLICT. All resolutions, County policies or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed insofar and they conflict herewith.

SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This resolution shall be effective upon passage.

A RESOLUTION AMENDING THE PERSONNEL POLICY FOR EMPLOYEES OF CHEROKEE COUNTY, KANSAS, REGARDING CONCEALED CARRY OF HANDGUNS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF CHEROKEE COUNTY, KANSAS, THAT THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED:

SECTION 1. GENERAL AUTHRITY. K.S.A. 19-101, et. seq., and K.S.A. 19-212 authorize the Board of County Commissioners of Cherokee County, Kansas, to transact all County business and perform all powers of local legislation deemed appropriate, and to make all contracts and do all other acts in relation to the property and concerns of the County necessary to the exercise of its corporate or administrative powers.

SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE ACTION. The Cherokee County Personnel Policy shall be amended to reflect compliance with 2016 revisions to K.S.A. 2015 Supp. 75-7c10, as enacted by passage of House Bill 2502.

SECTION 3. GENERAL POLICY. PERSONNEL POLICY HANDBOOK FOR CHEROKEE COUNTY, KANSAS; <u>NEW APPENDIX D, POLICY FOR CONCEALED CARRY OF HANDGUNS</u>.

County employees and officials who are not otherwise prohibited by State or Federal law from possessing a firearm may carry concealed handguns in conformance with the Kansas Personal and Family Protection Act, K.S.A. 75-7c01, et. seq., as amended.

Carrying of a concealed handgun is not within the course and scope of employment with Cherokee County except for employees who are certified law enforcement officers: Sheriff's deputies and security guards licensed to carry firearms and retained by Cherokee County, who are performing such services; Federal and State law enforcement and protective service personnel; and members of the Uniformed Services actively engaged in the performance of their duties.

The following list includes the policies applicable to Cherokee County employees who are not certified law enforcement officers:

a. Any injury while working that is caused by the employee choosing to carry a concealed handgun will not be considered for workers' compensation.

- b. Any liability associated with the employee's decision to carry a concealed handgun will not be defended by the County and will be of a personal nature since the carrying of a concealed handgun is not part of the employee's duties.
- c. Employees are prohibited from open carry or brandishing of a handgun or leaving a handgun in plain view, or unattended.
- d. Employees shall abide by all laws related to conceal carry, such as not entering any building, private or public, which prohibits conceal carry.
- e. Firearms should not be stored in a County-owned vehicle.
- f. The County is not responsible for the replacement or repair of any lost or damaged handgun.
- g. The election of an employee to carry a concealed handgun should not interfere with the employee's ability to perform any duties and should not obstruct any required safety equipment or procedures.

SECTION 4. INCORPORATION. The Policy For Concealed Carry Of Handguns is incorporated as Appendix D to the Personnel Policy Handbook For Cherokee County, Kansas.

SECTION 5. ACKNOWLEGDMENT. Every Cherokee County employee shall be provided a copy of APPENDIX D, POLICY FOR CONCEALED CARRY OF HANDGUNS. Employees shall sign an acknowledgment that he or she has received a copy and understands the contents. Signed acknowledgments shall be maintained in employees' personnel files.

SECTION 6. PUBLICATION. The County Clerk shall cause this resolution to be published in the official County Newspaper.

SECTION 7. CONFLICT. All resolutions, County policies or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed insofar and they conflict herewith.

A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING RIGHT-OF-WAY POLICY FOR CHEROKEE COUNTY, KANSAS

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF CHEROKEE COUNTY, KANSAS, THAT THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED:

- **SECTION 1. Definitions.** (a) "Public right-of-way" means only the area of real property in which the County has a dedicated or acquired right-of-way interest in the real property. It shall include the area on, below or above the present and future streets, alleys, avenues, roads, highways, parkways or boulevards dedicated or acquired as right-of-way. The term does not include the airwaves above a right-of-way with regard to wireless telecommunications or other nonwire telecommunications or broadcast service easements obtained by utilities or private easements in platted subdivisions or tracts.
- (b) "Occupant" means any person, firm, corporation, association, utility or entity which enters upon the right-of-way of the County, or in any manner establishes a physical presence on, upon, in or over the right-of-way of the County for the purpose of installing, constructing, maintaining or operating lines, conduits, wires, fiber optic wires, cables, pipes, pipelines, poles, towers, vaults or appliances, or related facilities or appurtenances thereto.
- **SECTION 2.** Authorization from County Required. (a) No person, firm, corporation, association, utility or entity shall enter upon the right-of-way of the County, or in any manner establish a physical presence on, upon, in or over the right-of-way of the County for the purpose of installing, constructing, maintaining or operating lines, conduits, wires, fiber optic wires, cables, pipes, pipelines, poles, towers, vaults or appliances, or related facilities or appurtenances thereto without the express written permission of the County. The permission of the County may be granted by a franchise agreement pursuant to the provisions of K.S.A. 12-2001, et. seq., or by such other agreement as the governing body determines best protects the public interest in the right-of-way.
- (b) Nothing in this Resolution shall be interpreted as granting an occupant the authority to construct, maintain or operate any facility or related appurtenance on property owned by the County outside of the public right-of-way.
- (c) The County shall process each valid and administratively complete application for use of the right-of-way within 30 days.
- **SECTION 3.** Health, Safety, and Welfare Regulations. The authority of a provider to use and occupy the public right-of-way shall always be subject and subordinate to the reasonable public health, safety and welfare requirements and regulations of the County.

- **SECTION 4. Specific Portions of Right-of-Way Restricted.** (a) The County hereby has the authority to prohibit the use or occupation of specific portions of public right-of-way by a provider due to a reasonable public interest necessitated by public health, safety and welfare, exercised in a competitively neutral manner including:
 - 1. prohibition based upon recommendation of the County engineer;
 - 2. the provider has rejected a reasonable, competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory justification offered by the County for requiring installation expenses nor a diminution of service quality;
 - 3. the County reasonably determines, after affording the provider reasonable notice and an opportunity to be heard, that a denial is necessary to protect the public health and safety and is imposed on a competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory basis; or
 - 4. the specific portion of the public right-of-way for which the provider seeks use and occupancy is environmentally sensitive as defined by state of federal law or lies within a previously designated historic district as defined by local, state or federal law.
- SECTION 5. Compliance With, Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices. Any occupant of the public right-of-way shall comply with the provisions of Standards and Guides for Traffic Controls for Street and Highway Construction, Maintenance, Utility, and Incident Management Operations Part IV of the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD), published by the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, 2009 Edition, which is incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth herein.
- **SECTION 6.** Additional Requirements. The County may impose additional requirements of right-of-way occupants excluding the following:
 - 1. requirements that particular business offices or other telecommunications facilities be located in the County;
 - 2. requirements for filing applications, reports and documents that are not reasonably related to the use of a public right-of-way;
 - 3. requirements for County approval of transfers of ownership or control of the business or assets of a provider's business, except that the County may require that such entity maintain current point of contact information and provide notice of a transfer within a reasonable time; and
 - 4. requirements concerning the provision or quality of customer services, facilities, equipment or goods in-kind for use by the County, political subdivision or any other provider or public utility.
- **SECTION 7. Emergencies.** If there is an emergency necessitating response work or repair, any person, firm, corporation, association, utility, or entity which has been granted permission to occupy the public right-of-way may begin that repair or emergency response work or take any action required under the circumstances, provided that the person, firm, corporation, association, utility or entity notifies the County promptly after beginning the work and timely thereafter meets any permit or other requirement had there not been such an emergency.
- **SECTION 8.** Repair. Any occupant of the public right-of-way is hereby required to repair all damage to a public right-of-way caused by the activities of that occupant, or of any agent affiliate, employee or subcontractor of that occupant while occupying, installing, repairing or

maintaining facilities in a public right-of-way and to return the right-of-way to its functional equivalence before the damage pursuant to the reasonable requirements and specifications of the County. If the occupant fails to make the repairs required by the County, the County may effect those repairs and charge the occupant the cost of those repairs.

SECTION 9. Relocation. Whenever requested by the County, in order to accomplish construction and maintenance activities directly related to improvements for the health, safety and welfare of the public, an occupant shall promptly remove its facilities from the public right-of-way or shall relocate or adjust its facilities within the public right-of-way at no cost to the political subdivision. Such relocation or adjustment shall be completed as soon as reasonably possible within the time set forth in any request by the County for such relocation or adjustment. Any damages suffered by the County or its contractors as a result of such occupant's failure to timely relocate or adjust its facilities shall be borne by such occupant.

SECTION 10. Fees. The following fees shall be assessed against occupants of the public right-of-way:

- (e) A performance bond in a form acceptable to the County from a surety licensed to conduct surety business in the State of Kansas, insuring appropriate and timely performance in the construction and maintenance or facilities located in the public right-of-way.
- SECTION 11. Indemnity. (a) Occupants shall indemnify and hold harmless the County and its officers and employees against any and all claims, lawsuits, judgments, costs, liens, losses, expenses, fees (including reasonable attorney fees and costs of defense), proceedings, actions, demands, causes of action, liability and suits of any kind and nature, including personal or bodily injury (including death), property damage or other harm for which recovery of damages is sought, to the extent that it is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be caused by the negligence of the occupant, any agent, officer, director, representative, employee, affiliate or subcontractor of the provider, or their respective officers, agents, employees, directors or representatives while installing, repairing or maintaining facilities in a public right-of-way.
- (b) The indemnity provided by this subsection does not apply to any liability resulting from the negligence of the County, its officers, employees, contractors or subcontractors. If an occupant and the County are found jointly liable by a court of competent jurisdiction, liability shall be apportioned comparatively in accordance with the laws of this state without, however, waiving any governmental immunity available to the County under state law and without waiving any legal defenses of the parties under state or federal law.
- (c) This section is solely for the benefit of the County and occupant and does not create or grant any rights, contractual or otherwise, to any other person or entity.

SECTION 12. Claim Notification. An occupant shall promptly advise the County in writing of any known claim or demand against the provider or the County related to, or arising out of the occupant's activities in a public right-of-way.

SECTION 13. Penalty Provision. Any person, firm, corporation, association, utility or entity or agent, contractor or subcontractor thereof, violating any provision of this article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor offense and shall, upon conviction, be subject to a maximum fine of \$500.00. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 14. PUBLICATION. The County Clerk shall cause this resolution to be published in the official County Newspaper.

SECTION 15. CONFLICT. All resolutions, County policies or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed insofar and they conflict herewith.

RE: Monthly Update

This year, there have been 56 valid residential sales through the end of May totaling \$4,188,870 ranging in price from \$6,800 to \$429,000 with an average sale price of \$74,800.

The county's median ratio for those sold properties is 99.54 with a COD of 10.42.

There were insufficient commercial sales to perform a ratio study.

We are currently occupied in the view and inspect phase of the annual appraisal cycle which requires that we view and inspect all parcels of real property once every six years. With 1,388 parcels completed to date at a pace of approximately 19 parcels per day and with 1,244 parcels remaining, it is estimated that we will finish this phase by mid September.

With regard to next week's budget proposal, there have been several meaningful legislative changes that have the potential to significantly increase the cost of doing business for my department. One of particular concern is the addition of another appeal process in which taxpayers have 60 days after the date when the notice of informal meeting results is mailed to the taxpayer pursuant to K.S.A. 79-1448, any taxpayer aggrieved by the final determination of the county appraiser, who has not filed an appeal with the board of tax appeals, may file with the county appraiser a third-party fee simple appraisal performed by a Kansas certified general real property appraiser that reflects the value of the property as of January 1 for the same tax year being appealed. I would have 15 days to review the appraisal. If I do not agree with the value conclusion, I am required me to either perform a single-property appraisal or commission a fee simple single property appraisal.

It is anticipated that the number of taxpayers who utilize this appeal process will be small at first and will build over time. However, it is difficult to predict with any degree of confidence how much this new appeal process will impact the future budgets.

The Presbyterian Church served free lunches for twenty one years as of 2015.

The summer of 2015, there was \$2737.54 to begin the program. We served 1046 adult meals, 800 children, 153 volunteer meals (with over 570 hours of volunteer labor again) and 754 seconds/thirds over **nine weeks**. Our total plate servings were 2,753. We spent \$4098.57 in 2015 and received donations of \$1972.80 which leaves a balance of \$611.77. This cost not only included food and drink but also the paper plates, cups, napkins, plastic cutlery, paper towels, dishwashing liquid and toilet paper. The Presbyterian Church has furnished (at no cost to the program) the electricity and gas for water, air conditioning etc. and clean up as our mission.

Nine people from Columbus, met at the Methodist Church to discuss the future of the Community Free Lunch Program (CFLP) on August 18, 2015. Toni Spieth started the meeting with a devotional encouraging each person to see the Holy Spirit in one another.

The four churches represented were the First Christian, First Presbyterian, First United Methodist, and St. Rose Catholic Church all from Columbus. Those attending were Marilyn and Paul Rogers, Carolyn Eddington, Rev. Roger Beason, Susan Schultz, Patty Hale, Judy Leighty, Rev. Michael Roberts, Michael Skahan and Toni Spieth.

After discussion, it was agreed to continue the CFLP next summer with the starting date of May 23rd through August 17, 2016. It will be held at the St. Rose Parrish Hall, 129 N. Kansas Avenue in Columbus. Toni will begin as facilitator for the first three weeks then will turn it over to the Catholic rep, then for 3 weeks to the First Christian Church with the First Methodist Church overseeing the last three weeks of the program. Judy Leighty will continue as Treasurer. The First Christian Church has set up a 501 C3 program. Toni sent PDF files to the committee members of paperwork necessary to run the program including Job Descriptions, check lists, daily tally, advertising bulletins, volunteer list, and notices. The meeting closed with all singing together, "Bless Be the Tie That Binds."

On 5/1/16 the Community Free Lunch Program had a balance of \$5090.93. Our expenses for the first six weeks have totaled \$3,559.55 leaving a balance in the account of \$1,531.38 to pay the expenses for the next six weeks. As of 7/6/16 we have served 1984 meals and we expect the number of meals and expenses to increase in the final six weeks of 2016 as summer school ends on 7/8/16. The seventy children in summer school have been receiving lunch and many of these children will be in need of a meal. The income for the Free Lunch Program has been received from these sources: Area Churches, Businesses, Organizations, Individuals, Grants, Columbus Days Breakfast fundraiser and the Methodist dinner where all the proceeds went to the project.

The project is all volunteer. Toni Spieth serves as the facilitator and organized the first three weeks of serving. Regina Jameson coordinated the second three weeks of operation for the Catholic Church. Peggy Lacoste, First Christian Church, secured volunteers for the third three weeks and Judith Leighty will coordinate the final 3 weeks for the First United Methodist Church. Mrs. Leighty also serves as the Treasurer.

We appreciate any assistance the Foundation is able to provide so we can serve the children and their families a meal until school begins.





This responds to your request received on February 26, 2016, for U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service review and comment on a proposed bridge repair project known as the Galena Bridge Improvement Project. The project proposes to remove the old asphalt overlay, followed by partial/full deck restoration; including any necessary repairs needed to the sides and under deck of the walkway overhang. Additionally, any damaged or missing posts and railings will be restored. The project is located in Cherokee County, Kansas.

Based on review of the proposed action and the land uses on site, I conclude that no federally-threatened or endangered species are likely to be present in the project area.

However, the Migratory Bird Treaty Act prohibits the taking, killing, possession, and transportation, (among other actions) of migratory birds, their eggs, parts, and nests, except when specifically permitted by regulations. While the Act has no provision for allowing unauthorized take, the USFWS realizes that some birds may be killed during the bridge improvement project even if all known reasonable and effective measures to protect birds are used. The USFWS Office of Law Enforcement carries out its mission to protect migratory birds through investigations and enforcement, as well as by fostering relationships with individuals, companies, and industries that have taken effective steps to avoid take of migratory birds, and by encouraging others to implement measures to avoid take of migratory birds. It is not possible to absolve individuals, companies, or agencies from liability even if they implement bird mortality avoidance or other similar protective measures. However, the Office of Law Enforcement focuses its resources on investigating and prosecuting individuals and companies that take migratory birds without identifying and implementing all reasonable, prudent and effective measures to avoid that take. Companies are encouraged to work closely with Service biologists to identify available protective measures when developing project plans and/or avian protection plans, and to implement those measures prior to/during construction or similar activities.

The above comments pertaining to endangered species under our jurisdiction are provided pursuant to the ESA. This response does not preclude additional Service comments under other legislation.

The referenced project Galena Bridge Improvements was reviewed for potential impacts on crucial wildlife habitats, current State-listed Threatened and Endangered species and Species in Need of Conservation (SINC), and Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism managed areas for which this agency has administrative authority.

We provide the following general recommendations as applicable:

- · Avoid impacts to existing streams and rivers, adjacent riparian zones, wetlands, and native prairie and woodland areas.
- Implement and maintain standard erosion-control Best-Management-Practices during all aspects of
 construction by installing sediment barriers (wattles, filter logs, rock ditch checks, mulching, or any
 combination of these) across the entire construction area to prevent sediment and spoil from entering
 aquatic systems. Barriers should be maintained at high functioning capacity until construction is completed
 and vegetation is established. For more information go to: http://www.kdheks.gov/stormwater/#construct
- Reseed disturbed areas with native warm-season grasses, forbs, and trees.

Results of our review indicate there will be no significant impacts to crucial wildlife habitats; therefore, no special mitigation measures are recommended. The project will not impact any public recreational areas, nor could we document any potential impacts to currently-listed Threatened or Endangered species or SINC. No Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism permits or special authorizations will be needed if construction is started within one year, and no design changes are made in the project plans.





HUD 8-Step Process – Flood Requirement

1. Determine Floodplain/Wetland

This action is located in a 100-year floodplain. The approximately 200 linear feet of bridge deck to be replaced and damaged rails to be repaired, is located within Zone A (no base flood elevations determined), as indicated on Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) Panel 335 of 500, no. 0335C, effective date of November 19, 2008. The map and close-up of the project area are attached for reference of the exact location of the project in relation to the floodplain.

This project proposes the major reconstruction of bridge deck and rails of the Galena Viaduct consisting of removing the old asphalt overlay followed by partial/full deck restoration including any necessary repairs needed to the sides and under deck of the walkway overhang. Additionally, any damaged or missing posts and railings will be restored. For these reasons, E.O. 11988 - Floodplain Management applies. This project does not meet any of the exceptions at 24 CFR 55.12 and therefore requires an 8-step analysis of the direct and indirect impacts associated with the construction and modification of the floodplain.

2. Early Public Review

A public notice describing the project was published in The Columbus News Report, the local and regional paper, on Friday, June 24, 2016. The noitce targeted local residents, including those in the floodplain. A copy of the published notification was kept in the project's environmental review records and attached to this document. The required 15 calendar days were allowed for public comment.

No comments were received from the public with floodplain concerns.

County engineers were contacted concerning mitigation requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) as well as local ordinances that must be implemented as part of NFIP.

3. Identify and Evaluate Alternatives (site)

The purpose of the proposed Cherokee County/Galena bridge project is to provide a safe route for vehicle traffic in and out of Galena on the north end of town and to preserve a historical viaduct of economic importance. This viaduct is essential for emergency responders to be able to respond quickly to citizens in the county when the Burlington Northern Santa Fe railroad blocks North Main at street level just west of the viaduct as trains change tracks. It also is significant to the Route 66 tourism income for the LMI community.

In determining the best option for maintaining safe vehicle traffic through the north end of Galena several alternative were considered:

- Construct a new viaduct: because the floodplain runs northwest/southeast and the new viaduct would run southwest/northeast, it is not logistically possible to not span the floodplain.
- Full deck replacement: this alternative would involve the complete removal and replacement of the existing deck. The work would have required cost prohibitive expenses for working with the railroad and equipment would have been the floodplain, requiring mitigation measures.
- Do nothing: was not a viable option because the decking on the viaduct had already
 deteriorated to the point that necessitated a reduction in the load limit. The unabated
 deterioration of the structure would eventually lead to closure of the important roadway.
- Deck reconstruction and repair: this alternative completes the restoration begun in Phase 1
 with no impact to the floodplain below because all work will be done on the deck,
 approximately 28 feet above the floodplain.

Deck reconstruction will provide a safe route for emergency responders, area citizens, and tourists.

4. Identify Flood Impacts

This project consists of replacing approximately 200 linear feet of the old asphalt bridge deck and repairing damaged rails. The project will have no impact on the floodplain because all work will take place approximately 28 feet above the floodplain.

Cherokee County is a member of the National Flood Insurance Program and, therefore, any structure owned by the county that is located in the flood zone must be covered by flood insurance. HUD requires projects located in the floodplain to maintain flood insurance for the life of the property.

The County has considered the natural and beneficial values of the floodplain. The natural resources of the floodplain include water, biological, and societal resources.

Special consideration has been given to the floodplain and railroad tracks below the project site. There will be no earthwork and no work will take place within the floodplain, all work will be done approximately 28 feet above it.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism have determined that the project will have no quantifiable impact on plant and animal life.

Societal resources were also considered during the design process. The designs are meant to complement the natural features of the area and to offer an aesthetically pleasing structure. The site will not have any effect on agricultural lands and there are no existing trees on site. The County will also allow the site to be accessible for archeological, historic, environmental, biological, and other scientific studies should and individual or an organization express interest.

- 5. Where practicable, design or modify the proposed action to minimize the potential adverse impacts to lives, property, and natural values within the floodplain and to restore, and preserve the values of the floodplain.
 - Preserving lives: In order to preserve lives, the County will close the road leading to the viaduct during periods of flooding.
 - Preserving property: This project consists of 200 feet of deck replacement approximately 28 feet above the floodplain. The County will maintain their membership in the NFIP and will acquire flood insurance on the structure if required by the program.
 - Preserving Natural Values and Minimizing Impacts: The alternative chosen at Step 3 eliminated floodplain impacts by preventing construction occurring in the floodplain. Impacts to the floodplain have been eliminated due to construction and equipment being limited to the deck surface located 28 feet above the floodplain.

6. Re-Evaluate the Alternatives

Although the Cherokee County/Galena bridge project spans the floodplain, the project has been adapted in order to minimize effects on floodplain values. The alternative selected will have no effect on the floodplain since all construction and equipment will be on the deck approximately 28 feet above.

Construction outside of the floodplain is not logistically possible as the floodplain runs northwest/southeast and the roadway runs southwest/northeast. It is not possible to connect this section of roadway without crossing the floodplain.

The no action alternative is also not practicable because it will not satisfy the need for a safe route for emergency responders to county residents north of Galena or for tourists traveling Route 66.


7. Determination of No Practicable Alternative


It is Cherokee County's determination that there is no practicable alternative for partially locating the project in the flood zone. This is due to: 1) the need to provide a safe route for emergency responders to county residents north of Galena and for tourists traveling Route 66; 2) the desire to complete the preservation of an existing historic structure started with Phase 1; 3) the need to construct an economically feasible project; 4) the ability to mitigate and minimize impacts on human health, public property, and floodplain values.

A final notice was published and posted consistent with the prior notice. The notice detailed the reasons why the modified project must be located in the floodplain, a list of alternatives considered, and all mitigation measures taken to minimize adverse impacts and preserve natural and beneficial floodplain values. No concerns were expressed by the public concerning this notice.

8. Implement the Proposed Action

The County will assure that this plan, as modified and described above, is executed and necessary language will be included in all agreements with participating parties. The County will also take an active role in monitoring the construction process to ensure no unnecessary impacts occur nor unnecessary risks are taken.

We have reviewed the materials received August 19, 2015 and August 22, 2015 regarding the above-referenced project in accordance with 36 CFR Part 800. In reviews of this nature, the SHPO determines whether a federally funded, licensed, or permitted project will adversely affect properties that are listed or determined eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The SHPO concurs that the proposed project will not adversely affect the National Register-listed Route 66 (Galena) Viaduct with the following conditions:

- 1. All work must follow the Secretary of Interior's (SOI) Standards for the treatment of Historic Properties, http://www.nps.gov/tps/standards/four-treatments/treatment-rehabilitation.htm
- 2. The concrete post and beam rail will be repaired rather than replaced. If the damaged section cannot be repaired, the damaged section must be replaced in-kind and incorporated into the existing railing. The new concrete post and beam railing section must match the old in design, color, texture, and materials. Please see SOI Standards, "Standards for Rehabilitation #6."
- 3. The patching and repair of the underdeck should not alter any distinctive materials and features. Please see SOI Standards, "Standards for Rehabilitation #1."
- 4. If the scope of work changes or includes additional work, our office will need to have the opportunity to comment.

Meeting the above conditions, the project may proceed.



Historic properties of religious and cultural significance include: archeological sites, burial grounds, sacred landscapes or features, ceremonial areas, traditional cultural places, traditional cultural landscapes, plant and animal communities, and buildings and structures with significant tribal association. The types of activities that may affect historic properties of religious and cultural significance include: ground disturbance (digging), new construction in undeveloped natural areas, introduction of incongruent visual, audible, or atmospheric changes, work on a building with significant tribal association, and transfer, lease or sale of properties of the types listed above.

If a project includes any of the types of activities below, invite tribes to consult:
